Characterised by pausing, snapping, gliding, bone breaking, hat tricks, animation and contortion, flex is a form of street dance that has evolved from the Jamaican bruk-up found in dance halls and reggae clubs in Brooklyn. This electrifying phenomenon has toured internationally for five years, confronting issues of social justice through the eyes and bodies of the dancer-activists. Flex pioneer Reggie (Regg Roc) Gray, visionary director Peter Sellars, and 13 FLEXN dancers engage the Porirua community in collaborations, conversations, performances, a masterclass and student summit.

FLEXN Public Performance

Created in the era of unrest following the murders of Michael Brown in Ferguson, Missouri, and Eric Garner in New York City, this powerful work is made in collaboration with a crew of flex dancers from the very neighbourhoods where the Black Lives Matter movement first took shape. Performing both as individuals and in groups to choreography created by the ensemble itself, the dancers utilise their breathtakingly beautiful movement to tell deeply human and sometimes heartwrenching stories that address the troubling issues of our time.

Moderated by Reggie (Regg Roc) Gray and Peter Sellars, each performance is accompanied by a 20-minute public conversation which feature cross-disciplinary discussion and provide a unique lens through which to view the performance.

Within the frames of colonisation, Europeans deemed indigenous people not fully human in order to justify their exploitation. KANAKA is a theatre work created by Lemi Ponifasio and young Kanaky people from New Caledonia, who are working to rebuild their culture, their families and their country.
